CHEMICAL CHANGES OF IRON.—Some valuable experiments have recently been made, with a view to ascertain the chemical changes which pig iron undergoes during it conversion into wrough iron by puddling. It appears, from these experiments, that, in the puddling furnace, the first action is exercised upon the silioium, the amount of which decreases progressively within constant during the rest of the operation, and then appears to be reduced to the minimum during the reheating and rolling of the puddled bars. During the first hour there does not appear to be any decarbonization of the iron, but on the contrary, the amount of carbon is increased to the extent of twenty-one per cent. of the original amount at the end of this time.
