The party was then fined \$5 each, but in considera tion of this being the first case, a portion of the fine was remitted, and they were discharged on the payment of \$3 each. We are glad to see the Mayer so decided in this matter. Our firemen have long been in the habit of using the payement or street indiscriminately, as suited their convenience, and we conceive it is time that they should be stopped. This is the only city in which such liberties would be tolerated, and we cannot see why we should prove an exception to the general rule.
