Railroad Statistics in Pennsylvanir. The receipt of a volume of nine hundred and forty one pages, containing the "Annual Report of the Railroad Commission of the State of New York," has again brought to our mind-and this time with increased force—the necessity of a new department in the Government of this State. in order that authentic statistics of a vast interest in which Pennsylvania overtops all other States, may be registered in one office and reported to the Legislature, thereby adding one more to the existing series of useful and inter-

esting "Executive Documents." There are in Pennsylvania more than fifty Railroad Companies, owning more than two thousand five hundred miles of railroad open to traffic. costing in the aggregate more than one hundred and thirty millions of dollars! And yet of this vast interest there is no compact record, for some of the companies do not even print their official reports for the use of their own stockholders! Ferms Cash.

And if the State, through the Legislature that

gave birth in acts of incorporation to the companies who control the enormous sums invested n permanent railroad improvements, should, for any purpose, desire to acquire accurate informa-tion of their cost, condition and operations, she would find many obstacles to be overcome before attaining her object; while citizens of the State and of other States, who hold shares of stock and certificates of loan in railroads within the State, have no access to a public record, such as is kept in the State of New York and elsewhere;

because, as we have said, no such record is provided for by law in Pennsylvania. On the first of January, the railroads in Pennsylvania and New York thus compared: Name. In miles. Length in Coast of roads. New York.....2,8841 Pennsylvania...3,461 \$133,791,824 It is observed that Pennsylvania leads New York in number of miles and amount of cost, and yet in Pennsylvania there is no official bureau or the collection and registration of data showing the progress of her railroads, while in New York all this information can be compiled from
