LOCAL AFFAIRS.

The New Law Judge. The members of the Pitteburgh Bar have prepared and forwarded to the members of the Legislature, a memorial, asking for the passage of a law authorizing the the election of an additional Judge, learned Court, Register's Court, and the Court of Oyer and Terminer and General Jail Delivery for this county. the business upon the various argument lists, and the necessity for the speedy despatch of causes on the frequently met in the evening and remained in session until midnight. The criminal business has been rapidly increasing, and the dockets of the Cour tof Common Pleas show that only during two or three weeks of the year can a jury be summoned for the trial of civil issues.

The amount and variety of business transacted by the Court of Common Pleas is astenishing. During the year 1857 the record shows that this Court considered and decided upon questions arising upon slaven cases of voluntary assignment; forty-and di vorce cases were commenced, and the greater per tion finally noted upon; seventy-nine charters were examined and granted to religious and charitable institutions; nine applications for the appointment of viewers and assessment of damages by railroad ompanies were heard; three commissions of lunacy were ordered; six petitions in relation to trust estates were acted upon; and sixty-four actions against lot owners, on grading and paving claims, were instituted by the city of Allegheny. In addition to these, the Court entertained proceedings under election laws; petitions to change the names of parties; bills to perpetuate testimony; mandamus cases; cases under the new banking law; plank road cases; division of turnpikes; for the orection and abolish ing of school districts; applications for the appointment and removal of constables; appeals from the Board of Licensers; tax appeals; habeas corpus cases; and a great number of others, important in their nature and difficult in their solution. A written opinion, in almost every case, was prepared and filed, the preparation of which required learning, patience water appropriation, to be charged to the contingent from the water appropriation was referred back to the water appropriation.

The business of the Orphans' Court is equally, if not more important, and requires more time than can possibly be devoted to it by Judges with such a multiplicity of business multiplicity of business. But the greatest amount of business claiming the attention of the Judges is in the Courts of Oyer and Terminer and Quarter Sessions. These Courts are engaged in the trial of criminals, with but a short vacation, from the first of October to the first of July, every year; and during the past year this term was extended to the 17th of July The labor of the President Judge is very onerous. The day passes in Court and the night is spent in writing charges for juries. There is no cessation from labor, no rest for an over-taxed brain. During the March torm, 1857, there four hundred and twenty-one cases on the docket, and three hundred and forty-nine true bills were found, which were all disposed of.
