

MANUFACTURE OF SHEET GLASS -It is comratively but a few y- are since the general induction of the mode of making sheet glass according to the processes in vogue among the French and Belgians, but the manufacture has ow occome one of much importance Anything fore striking than the details of the manufacure, can hardly be met with in the whole range of industry. The workman dips his iron tube into the semi-viscid glass, and takes up a quantity amounting to twelve or fourteen pounds. He rolls the mass on a wooden block till it assumes a cylindrical form; he applies his mouth to the other end of the tube, and plows until the mass assumes a hollow evoid form; he whirls this round his bead, or, rather, in a vertical circle ten or twelve feet in diameter, and elongates the ovoid into a cylinder with round ends; he reeats the glass two or three times, during these occases, to maintain the proper consistency. and, at length, the remote end of the hollow mass gives way, and the result is a cylinder of glass attached only at one end to the tube. The cylinders are dissevered from the tube, and are cut engthwise with a diamond, and then are placed n a kiln, where the heat gradually opens the issure, and there is finally presented a flat piece of glass, which can be out to any smaller size.
