The City Finances. In the City Conneils last evening, Henry Lambert, Esq., the City Controller, submitted a report, accompanied by a statement of the real and personal

Pittsburgh. The report states that the members of the fire companies claim that the interest of the city in their apparatus is not so great as the statement sets forth, and also announces that the assessments under the new paving law would shortly be in the Treasurer's hands for collection. It is the opinion of the Controller, and also, we have been informed, of the Finance Committee, that the payment for paving must be made in cash, inasmuch as the proceeds are sot apart for the Sinking Fund. Instructions are asked as to whether the Treasurer shall be authorized to receive warrants for paving tax, as unless Councils order otherwise, the Controller announces that he will instruct the Treasurer not to receive warrants for paving obligations. It strikes us that the warrant of the city, which is in fact a sight check upon her Treasurer, is in fact cash so far as the city is concerned as a creditor.
