In the eity of Washington the opinion appears to prevail, probably from intimations thrown out at the British Embassy, that the Government of Great Britain will in- hands are in high spirits sist upon the "right of visitation" as absolutely essential to the suppression of the slave trade. If this position should be assumed by the English Government, it is idle farther to debate the question. Our government has but one course to pursue, and that is a very plain one. If any foreign vessel of war is guilty of the outrage of stopping our ships upon the ocean, the United States national vessels should at once be sent to seize her or blockade her in any port in which she may take refuge. If Great Britain persists in claiming to exercise authority over vessels engaged in lawful commerce under the protection of the United States flag over which our jurisdiction is exclusive, the government in defence of its sovereignty must resist the offensive assumption, and proceed to capture such vessels as are engaged in intercepting our own. Consistently with our national honor, no other course can be pursued, and if these British outrages upon our flag are no

Bishops of Pennsylvania. Since the establishment of the Episcopal Church in this country, there have been but three Bishops in Pennsylvania. The first of these, the venerable William White, was consecrated at Lambeth Palace, by Scottish Bishops, in 1787. When his health failed with advancing years, Rev. Henry U. Onderdonk, D. D., was elected Assistant Bishop, and was consecrated, October 25th, 1827. On the death of Bishop White, in 1837, Bishop Onderdonk succeeded him, and continued to perform the duties of Bishop of the diocese until his resignation in May, 1845. Rev. Olonzo Potter.
