This gentleman said that the Philadelphis Board of Trade had always wished to cultivate feiendly reintions with their sister cities, and especially with Pittsburgh. They had heard that there was a feeing in our community in mical to Philadelphis, but they would not and could not believe it. He admitted that they were in favor of the repeal of the Tonousge Tax as the great interests of the West demnided it, and the object of this visit was to endeavor to show us that she tax was of no beneal to us, but very prejudicial to them. It is assumed that this tax produces an annual reveone of \$200,000. This revenue, however, accraes to the sinking fund, and does not benefit immediately our citizens, sinking fund, and does not be of immediately our citizans, as it is applied to the payment of the public debt. The speaker would dispense with a sinking find. He was opposed to paying off the debt of the State for the benefit of posterity. We have constructed internal improvements for tasiff tonefit, which will be of value to them to their latest day, and it is absurd for us to liquidate this old debt. The acceptance is value of public property in the next forty years with concet this debt, and to pay this debt would be injustice.

The regal of the tonuage tax will enhance the value of property. Three-niths of the inhabitants are included within a belt of twenty mides on either side of the Pennsylvania Railroat. The building of the road has increased the value of tru land two dollars more. On seven million acres the enhancement of value would be seventy million dollars, the interest on which will reach two hundred thousand dollors, the sun now produced by the tax.

The speaker then went on to enumerate the effects of the tax on our city. He stated that we had been disappointed in the results following the building of the Pennsylvania Railroad, that we feel as though the trade passed through our city—instead of it being a great distributing point. Philade-phia won't not object to this if it were possible, but they could not help it. It would have been to the interest of this city if the trade was carried on by the old wagon system, especially with the use of the canal to Philadelphia. However o noxious the road may be, some advantages yet accrue to u But Pittsburghers says this road discriminates agains But Pittsburghers says this road discriminates against Pittsburgh freights, which was doubtlees true. But this company could not do otherwise. If the trade of the West could be secured without this, our opposition was justifiable, and the discrimination was wrong. But it is necessary that the road should obtain from some source sufficient revenue to pay the current expenses. But the rates of feeders obtained in Pennsylvania cannot be imposed upon

freight obtained in Pennsylvania cannot be imposed upor freights from the West; if they could, the capidity of the freights from the West; it they could, the capidity of the road would dictate that such charges should be imposed. If the road charged the same rates as in this State for Western freights, that entire trade would be lost. If the road realizes to a thorsand dollars from Western trade, it is a bounty to Fenosylvania in proportion as trade from the West increases. It is therefore to the advantage of our city to adopt means to increase the trade from the West. Esting to do this, we will compet the road to raise her tariff unfficiently to produce an income large enough to meet her expenses. But there were other advantages recraing to Fittsburgh from the building of this road.
