whose aim should be the reduction of the rates charged by that company. By Pittsburgh merchants, more particularly, should this question be well considered and better understood. To my mind this tonnage tax is an imposition and should be repealed by the Legislature. Why? Because it compels us to pay into the Treatury of the State on goods transported on the Central Railread a large amount of money, thereby taxing a few for the benefit of the many. Pittsburgh bears the heaviest burthen, and for her I now speak, not forgetting the interests of the entire Commonwealth. Take, for instance, the recenting of our ward once. speak, not forgetting the interests of the entire Commonwealth. Take, for instance, the receipts of our warehouses, and you will find that the heaviest tax paid for business purposes does not equal the surplus amount paid to the company in company in consequence of the three mills tax. This sum may seem small to many of you, but when the several amounts paid by the hundreds of our business houses are consolidated, the aggregate shows how largely we contribute to the State Treasurer without naming a corresponding advantage.

Were this tax levied on us in a direct way, the very essential to which I have alluded, together with every edizents of taxed, would violate the laws by a refusal to pay, and they would be sustained in such a course by Justice and the State Constitution. It would be a special legislation which our present Executive officers would ignore. This tax means precisely the same trunk. We are taxed in same of the Pennsylvana Railroad; or, cather, that company acts as the collector for the State in compelling us to pay an extra tax on every hundred pounds of freights carried on its road. It is claimed that by this tax a large amount of revenue accrues to the State. This is very true; but far be it from

accrues to the State. This is very true; but far be it from me to approve of the taxing of one portion of the State for the purpose of defraying the exponses of the whole; and however patriotic my heart may feel towards the good old Commonwealth of Pennsylvania and the liquidation of her obligations, that patriotism will not lead me so far as to expend my means by compulsion. This would not be patriotism. The patriotic citizen makes his offering voluntarily.

In my opinion this tonnage tax is an imposition, and the Lagislature should repeal it. But us a citizens of Pittsburgh and Western Pennsylvania, I feel it to be my duty, as cneman especially identified with her interests, to oppose this repeal, unless we can gain by the capitulation. I use the word "capitulation" in its most significant sense. Philadelphia and the Pennsylvania Railroad, through their representatives, to whom we listened with so much pleasure on last evening, have signified a willingness to treat, and archere with the flag of true. He closed his speech with an applexy, which was certainly necessary under the circums ances, and sat down after occupying the meeting for an hour and a half, without speaking upon the subject of the tonnage fax, except once or twice incidentally, in the course of his philxcept once or twice incidentally, in the course of his phil-ppie against railroads and those who manage them. Mr. Souders, of Philadelphia, said the Committee had not expected to make any remarks to this meeting. The Committee, however, did not represent the Pennsylvania Railroad Company, and they wished this distinctly understood. He expati ted on the advantages to Pittsburgh to be realized from the repeal of this tax, as he knew that so soon as th tax is thrown off, it will ceas to be collected. He believed that it was our interest to advocate the report. Be con-

ceives that the same effect is produced on our trade by this tax as on that of Philade phia, and he was aware that it is injurious to them. Mr. M'Auley asked if the Committee was authorized to say that the tax would be thrown off if repealed, to which Mr. Souders replied in the affirmative. Mr. M'Auley thought that the reduction on freight coming only to Pittsburgh was a small matter. He thought we needed the tomage tax to make up our revenue, and close with a few remarks on discriminations.

Mr. Souders explained the principle of the division of freights received on a long line of roads extending f.om West to East. Were the tax repealed, the Penusylvania Railroad would receive the same proportion as now, and consequently Mr. Dickey thought the repeal would not remove the principal difficulty-that of discrimination against Pittsburgh.

Dr. Gazzani followed in a strain similar to his previous speech, and after haranguing the meeting for another quarter of an hour, took his seat to the satisfaction of every one-Mr. Errett thought there was a discrepancy between Mr. Thomas and Mr. Souders, which was explained by the latter

Mr. M'Auley asked Mr. Thomas if froights can be carried to the We t at present rates and pay the road for the wear

and tear.

Mr. Thomas said the speech of Dr. Grzzam had been directed against the Penosylvania Radrovi, which his committee did not represent. That corporation is not rich enough to buy the influence of this committee. Their reciling for the corporation of Philadelphia was sint ar. They came here to ascertain whether this tax can be repealed without injury to our interests. If they thought it could not be they would go back to Philadelphia and oppose its repeal. The speaker was sorry that the arguments advanced had not touched the main point in question. He asked if the gentlemen expected the rates along the entire line of the road to be reduced to the same proportion as to the West. He thought such a policy would be ruinous. A Western trade must be advantage ons to Pittsburgh—If not, it is our interest to cut off all such trade. The speaker referrated some of his remarks of Thu aday evening relative to the effect of an increased Western trade on Pittsburgh and on Philadelphia.

This Committee has had no correspondence with the

This Committee has had no correspondence with the Pennsylvania Railroad Company, except what Mr. Thomas himself had with Mr. Foster, the Vice President of the Com pany. He had propounded several interrogatories; among them was one asking them if the repeal of the tounage tax was effected, if the reduction would accrue to the benefit of Pennsylvania merchants, to which an affirmative answer

was returned. Dr. Gazzam said that the desire of the people was to have the rates equalized throughout Pennsylvania, the Eastern States and the Great West. . Mr. Bennett thought the tax affected not only the manufacturers of Pittsburgh, but of all Western Pennsylvania, but the merchants who sold goods to the furnaces in this

section of the State. He thought the tax should not be reduced, but doubled. Mr. Errett made a short "buncombe" speech, which was replied to by Mr. Thomas, in a few pertinent remarks. Campbell paid a left-handed co zam's speech, and spoke at some length in opposition to the


