This is a roorthe official record. It appears that the aggregate of the expenditure (exclusive of the payon account of public debt) was between sixty-four and sixty-five millions. And according to the estimates that have been published in the Union and National Inteligencer, at Washington, the anticipated expenditures for the cost of carrying on the government for the year 1859, in stead of reaching eighty-three millions of dol

lars, will not exceed \$53,500 000. That the expenditures for the support of the government should gradually increase with the rogress of the country, is to be expected .-That progress is shown in the increase of our population from some five millons in 1800, to near if not quite, twenty-seven millions at this time; an increase in the extent of the country from less than one million of square miles, to eight hundred square miles; an increase in the income of the government, from some ten millions of dollars in 1800, to over sixty-eight millions five hundred thousand in 1857; and an increase in the exports of the country, from less than seventy millions of dollars worth in [1820, to over three hundred and twenty-six millions of dollars worth in 1856.
