The Atlantic Telegraph Cable. There are some who think that the Atlantic Cable has spoken its last words; there it talk intelligibly is to have it in the hands of American electricians, under their direction and with their instruments in operation. Dr. Whitehouse and Dr. Thomson have both failed to make it work; the experiments of the first named individual have cost the company, it is said, \$176,000. He was to receive a salary of \$50,000 a year as the electrician of the Company, if he had put the cable in successful operation. Hughes has authority now to make experiments with his instrument. If he fail, then the electricians of the world are to be called on to help out of the difficulty. It has happened before that submarine cables have refused to operate, though when they were first laid the signals were perfect. 
