Tobey to sell Mills in the above states and Amos Trask, of Sangersfield, in the state of New-York, has been empowered to sell Mills in the Ohio by the said C. Tobey; this is to notify the public, that their power is legally revoked and is void, and their agents if they have any. And if any person or persons after this date and notice should purchase Mills of the said Old or Trask, or their agents in the above territory, may be assured that they will be answerable to me for the right of usage, and if necessary will be proceeded against according as the law in such cases provides.

Gentlemen that are wanting Mills will be supplied by me, or my agents in the different states, with my patent Bark Mill or with Mr. Tobey's. Gentlemen will do well to examine the authority of those that offer Mills for sale. if they wish to avoid imposition.
