Tobey; this is to notify the public, that their power is legally revoked and is void, and their agents if they have any. And if any person or persons after this date and notice should purchase Mills of the said Olds or Trask, or their agents in the above territory, may be assured that they will be answerable to me for the right of usage, and if necessary will be proceeded against according as the law in such cases provides.
