The latter suggestion is certainly an unhappy one, and will meet with little favor in any quarter of the Union. A total abolition of the fanking privilege would at once meet the denand-for it has been estimated that the fullamount of franked matter reaches yearly \$2,500,000, a sum within a trifle of being as large as the deficit. The N. Y. Tribune, in anarticle on this subject, says the Pastmaster General "has not the courage to pleise the abolition of the franking privilege, nor the housiy to propose that Government should put for transporting its own matter. > LATER FROM MEXICO .- The Mexican papers of the 8th are filled with articles showing that the country is still the victim of mingled anar chy and tyrrany. The Press law is more inquistorial than any heretofore enacted. Numbers of journals have been obliged to suspend or altogether abandon publication, and several editors have been seized and thrown in prison. The Government is endeavoring to explain away the excessive odlousness of the enactment.
