AFFAIRS AT HOME.

THE WEATHER moderated considerably last week, and the snow thawed enough to destroy the sleighing, which had continued during a period of eighty-eight days, nearly one-fourth of a year. Monday was "frisky as a flirt;" near noon a general breeze was raised in the shape of an equinoxial storm.

It is feared that the severe and continued cold of the present winter has killed the peach trees in this section of country. Examinations have exhibited the fact that the bark on trees tested is dry and has apparently no vitality, and the more tender branches seem to be completely dead.

THE RIVER .- The water, within the last few days, has been raising the ice on the Susquehanna, not enough, however, to break it, tho' we may look for a general "break-up" in a snort time. It is unsafe to cross on the ice now; we have heard of several sleighs and sleds breaking through. Caution should be used, as fatal accidents might readily result from crossing.
