AFFAIRS AT HOME.

CLEARFIELD & TYRONE RAILROAD.—The charter for this company having been procured, an election for officers, for its permanent organization, is advertised to be held at Phillipsburg on the 5th May, as will be seen by a notice in to-day's Journal.

THE RIVER, last week, was too high for running rafts, the water having surrounded the banks in many places. On Friday it had fallen a little, but on the evening of that day and during Saturday some rain fell which caused it to rise higher than it has been for several years.

THE WEATHER, during the past week was pleasant, the sun shining with much warmth, which had the effect of melting away the greater portion of the snow which had accumulated in the woods during the winter to an unprecedented depth.

TIMBER ON THE SINNEMAHOING.—We learn that there has been got out on the Sinnemaohoing only about one-third the quantity of square timber, and nearly the same amount of boards there was last year.
