A FRIGHTFUL RAILROAD ACCIDENT OCCUITEd near Gwynned Station on the North Pennsylvania railroad, 13 miles from Philadelphia, on the 17th inst., by which not less than 50 persons were killed, and between 200 and 300 wounded. There shall be an additional article to said constitution to be designated as article eleven, as fol-OF PUBLIC DEBTS. lows :--SECTION 1. The state may contract debts, to supply casual deficits or failures in revenues, or to meet expenses not otherwise provided for ; but the aggregate amount of such debts, direct and contingent, whether contracted by virtue of one or more acts of the general assembly, or at different periods of time, shall never exceed seven hundred

and fifty thousand dollars, and the money arising from the creation of such debts, shall be applied to the purpose for which it was obtained, or to repay tock. Mellinger. Pratt, Price, Sellers, Shuman, Souther, Straub, Taggart, Walton, Welsh, Wherry, the debts so contracted, and to no other purpose whatever.

SECTION 2. In addition to the above limited power the state may contract debts to repel invasion, suppress insurrection. defend the state in war,

or edeem the present outstanding indebtedness of the state; but the money arising from the con-tracting of such debts, shall be applied to the purment ? pose for which it was raised, or to repay such debts, and to no other purpose whatever.

SECTION 3. Except the debts above specified, in sections one and two of this article, no debt whatever shall be created by, or on behalf of the state. SECTION 4. To provide for the payment of the present debt, and any additional debt contracted as aforesaid, the legislature shall, at its first session, after the adoption of this amendment, create a sinking fund, which shall be sufficient to pay the accruing interest on such debt, and annually to reduce the principal thereof by a sum not less than two hundred and fifty thousand dollars; which sinking fund shall consist of the net annual income of the public works, from time to time owned by the state, or the proceeds of the sale of the same. or any part thereof, and of the income or proceeds of sale of stocks owned by the state,

together with other funds, or resources, that may be designated by law. The said sinking fund may be increased, from time to time, by assigning to it any part of the taxes, or other revenues of the state, not required for the ordinary and current expenses of government, and unless in case of war. invasion or insurrection. no part of the said sinking fund shall be u ed or applied otherwise than in extinguishment of the public debt, until the amount of such debt is reduced below the sum of five millions of dollars.

SECTION 5. The credit of the commonwealth shall not in any manner, or event, be pledged, or loaned to, any individual, company, corporation, or association : nor shall the common wealth hereafter be come a joint owner, or stockholder, in any company, association. or corporation.

### MR. OLIVER'S MINORITY REPORT.

This gentleman, as our readers are aware. was one of the Congressional Committee that went to Kansas to inquire into the alleged outrages and wrongs, of which so much has been said. He did not co-operate very kindly with his colleagues, Messrs. Howard and Sherman, for the best of reasons, viz : that the disclosures there made bore very hard against the side he had espoused, and against ginning of the week at a friend's house above | a large number of Missourians, a part of whom are Mr. Oliver's constituents, who went into Kansas to help the people in voting. It is proved conclusively that he was with his Missouri brethren when they went into the Territory to aid the people to choose a Legislature. He says he did not vote, but he did make a speech to the border men while they were in Kansas cheating the people out of their just rights. He did not vote, but did he admonish the Missourians that they had no right to vote? by no means. He was with them for the purpose of seeing that enough should cast their votes to have the Legislature of the right stamp. he debt, or any part thereof, of any county, city, borough, or township; or of any corporation, or association ; unless such debt shall have been contracted to enable the state to repel invasion, suppress domestic insurrection, defend itself in time of war, or to assist the state in the discharge of

Section 7. The legislature shall not anthorize any county, city, borough, township, or incorporated district, by virtue of a vote of its citizens, or otherwise, to become a stockholder in any compafor, or loan its credit to, any corporation, association, institution, or party.

SECOND AMENDMENT. There shall be an additional article to said con-

stitution, to be designated as article XII, as follows : ARTICLE XII. OF NEW COUNTIES.

No county shall be divided by a line cutting off over one-tenth of its population, (either to form a

new county or otherwise ) without the express assent of such county, by a vote of the electors thereof; nor shall any new county be established, containing less than four hundred square miles.

TEIRD AMEADMENT.

From section two of the first article of the constitution, strike out the words, "of the city of Philadelphia, and of each county respectively;" from section five, same article, strike out the words, "o) Philadelphia and of the several counties ;" from section seven, same article, strike out the words. "neither the city of Philadelphia nor any." and insert in lien thereof the words. "and no;" and strike out section four, same article, and in lieu thoreof insert the following :

SECTION 4. In the year one thousand eight hun dred and sixty-four, and in every seventh year thereafter, representatives to the number of one hundred, shall be apportioned and distributed equally, throughout the state, by districts, in pro-portion to the number of taxable inhabitants in the several parts thereof ; except that any county containing at least three thousand five hundred taxables, may be allowed a separate representation; but no more than three counties shall be joined, and no county shall be divided, in the formation of a district. Any city containing a suffi-cient number of taxables to entitle it to at least two representatives, shall have a separate representation assigned it, and shall be divided into convenient districts of contiguous territory, of equal taxable population as near as may be, each which districts shall elect one representative." At the end of section seven, same article, insert these words, "the city of Philadelphia shall be divided into single senatorial districts, of contiguous territory as nearly equal in taxable population as possible; but no ward shall be divided in the

formation thereof." The legislature, at its first session, after the adoption of this amendment. shall divide the city of Philadelphia into senatorial and representative districts, in the manner above provided ; such distriets to remain unchanged until the apportionment in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-four.

#### FOURTH AMENDMENT.

To be section XXVI. Article 1. The legislature shall have the power to alter. revoke, or annul. any charter of incorporation hereafter conferred by, or under, any special, or general law, whenever in their opinion it may be injurious to the citizens of the commonwealth ; in such manner, however, that no injustice shall be done to the corporators.
