RESOLUTION PROPOSING AMENDMENTS TO THE CONSTITUTION OF THE COMMONWEALTH.

Resolved, by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania in General Assembly met, That the following amendments be proposed to the Constitution...

SECTION 1. The state may contract debts, to supply casual deficits or contingencies, but no such debts shall be contracted...

SECTION 2. In addition to the above limited power the state may contract debts to repel invasion, suppress insurrection, defend the state in war, or to relieve the present extraordinary necessities of the state...

SECTION 3. Except the debts hereinafter specified, in sections one and two of this article, no debt whatever shall be contracted by the state...

SECTION 4. To provide for the payment of the principal and interest on the public debt, the legislature shall, at its first session, after the adoption of this amendment, create a sinking fund...

SECTION 5. The credit of the Commonwealth shall not in any manner, or event, be pledged, or loaned to any individual, company, corporation, or association...

SECTION 6. The Commonwealth shall not assume the debt, or any part thereof, of any county, city, borough, or township, or of any corporation, or association, or any debt which has been contracted to enable the state to repel invasion, suppress domestic insurrection, defend itself in time of war, or to assist the state in the discharge of any portion of its present indebtedness...

SECTION 7. The legislature shall not authorize any county, city, borough, township, or incorporated district, by virtue of a vote of its citizens, or otherwise, to become a stockholder in any company, or to incur any debt, or to become a guarantor, or loan its credit to any corporation, association, institution, or party.

SECTION 8. There shall be an additional article to said constitution, to be designated as article XII, as follows: ARTICLE XII. OF NEW COUNTIES.

No county shall be divided by a line cutting off any portion of its population, territory, or territory of such county, or otherwise, without the express consent of such county, by a vote of the electors thereof...
