RESOLUTION, PROPOSING AMEND-MENTS TO THE CONSTITUTION OF THE COMMONWEALTH.

Resolved, by the Senate and House of Represen-tatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania in General Assembly met. That the following amendments are proposed to the Constitution of the Commonwealth, in accordance with the provisions of the tenth article thereof.

FIRST AMENDMENT. There shall be an additional article to said con-stitution to be designated as article cleven, as fol-OF PUBLIC DEBTS. lows :---

SECTION 1. The state may contract debts, to sup-ply ensual deficits or failures in revenues, or to meet expenses not otherwise provided for; but the aggregate amount of such debts, direct and contingent, whether contracted by virtue of one or more acts of the general assembly, or at different periods of time, shall never exceed seven hundred and fifty thousand dollars, and the money arising from the creation of such debts, shall be applied to the purpose for which it was obtained, or to repay the debts so contracted, and to no other purpose whatever.

SECTION 2. In addition to the above limited power the state may contract debts to repel inva-sion, suppress insurrection, defend the state in war, or to redeem the present outstanding indebtedness of the state; but the money arising from the contracting of such debts, shall be applied to the purpose for which it was raised, or to repay such

debts, and to no other purpose whatever. SECTION 3. Except the debts above specified, in sections one and two of this article, no debt whatever shall be created by, or on behalf of the state. SECTION 4. To provide for the payment of the present debt, and any additional debt contracted as aforesaid, the legislature shall, at its first ses-sion, after the adoption of this amendment, create a sinking fund, which shall be sufficient to pay the accruing interest on such debt, and annually to reduce the principal thereof by a sum not less than two hundred and fifty thousand dollars; which sinking fund shall consist of the net annual income of the public works, from time to time owned by the state, or the proceeds of the sale of the same. or any part thereof, and of the income or proceeds of sale of stocks owned by the state, together with other funds, or resources, that may designated by law. The said sinking fund may be increased, from time to time, by assigning to it any part of the taxes, or other revenues of the state, not required for the ordinary and current expenses of government, and unless in case of war. invasion or insurrection, no part of the said sink-ing fund shall be u ed or applied otherwise than in extinguishment of the public debt, until the amount of such debt is reduced below the sum of five millions of dollars.

SECTION 5. The credit of the commonwealth shall not in any manner, or event, be pledged, or loaned to, any individual, company, corporation, or asso-ciation; nor shall the commonwealth hereafter become a joint owner, or stockholder, in any company, association, or corporation.

SECTION 6. The commonwealth shall not assume the debt, or any part thereof, of any county, city, borough. or township; or of any corporation, or association; unless such debt shall have been contracted to enable the state to repel invasion, suppress domestic insurrection, defend itself in time of war, or to assist the state in the discharge of any portion of its present indebtedness.

Section 7. So I think in respect to the annulling of the Missouri Compromise line. Therefore, with these things staring me in the face, it seems to behoove me quietly to give my voice against them at the ballot box, if spared to do so, and I hope that all may calmly and coolly reflect and decide (seperate and apart from the excitement) to cast their votes on the side of mercy and justice. RECENTLY in Bourbon, Marshall county, Kentucky, a discussion took place between Hon. Schuyler Colfax and Judge Stewart. A number of Irishmen attacked a wagon, containing 4 men and a number of ladies, and with clubs knocked down the borses and commenced an indiscriminate assault upon all in the wagon. The consternation produced spread through the large crowd present. In the waggon was the wife of a Mr. Leffel, who rode back to protect her. His horse was knocked down, and finding too strong a force against him, he retreated to the house of Rev. Mr. James, whither he was pursued by the mob, who picked up axes as they went, broke in the windows and door and brutally murdered him, his legs and head being nearly cut to pieces. Mr. Colfax at this time was returning from supper. He was stopped and his life threatened. All parties agree that there was no provocation for this murderous assault. During the riot, one of the mob was shot.

MARYLAND .- The municipal election in Baltimore on the Sth, resulted in the success of Swan, American, by a large majority. Much disorder and confusion attended the election, and a number of fights, in which pistols and guns were freely used, took place. At a fight in Lexington market, three persons were killed. Swan's majority will reach 1,500.

Connerneur .- The elections for town officers took place on the 6th, in about half of the State. The Hartford Courant says that 126 towns have been heard from, the Republicans carrying 73, and the Democrats 48-divided, 5. Fremont gains 23 towns and Buchanan 14.

The latest news relative to the election in Connecticut, indicate plainly that the State will be carried for Fremont and Dayton by at least 7,000 to 8,000 majority.
