Log FLOATING is regarded in this county in the light of a nuisance, and many efforts have been made to have it restricted by law so as not to interfere with the running of rafts of timber and lumber; but the Legislature has been so tardy in acting upon the bill before It that our raftsmen have been subjected to this annoyance another season. Heretofore they have borne it as meekly as they could, but it seems with some "forbearance has ceased to be a virtue," and they have determined to apply a corrective themselves. Accordingly, on Clearfield creek, we understand, the logs with which the stream is literally filled, are being cut up in such a manner as to render them mon Schools of Clearfield county, and that worthless, whilst on other streams they are each Board of Directors be entitled to send cut up in such a manner as to render them driven full of spikes, pieces of pot metal, &c., and it is not at all improbable that still more extreme measures may be adopted, as many of our people are in a state of high exasperation.

HOSTILITIES COMMENCED .- The raftmen of Clearfield creek, having failed to obtain redress for the wrongs inflicted upon them by floating saw logs, as a last resort determined to take the law into their own hands and abate the nuisance by force of arms. On Thursday the 30th ult., they met at Clearfield Bridge, and constituted themselves a vigilance committee, by selecting proper officers and organizing in companies. On the 1st of May one of these companies, armed with rifles, shotguns and axes, under command of Captains Cline and Fiscus, marched to Driftwood Island, about 13 miles above this place, where they encountered a superior force of floaters. Notwithstanding the disparity of numbers, the raftmen attacked the floaters and for some time fought desperately, maintaining the unequal conflict until the arrival of reinforcements. But for the exertions of some of the raftmen, many of the floaters would have lost their lives-as the passions of the former were roused to the highest pitch. After the fight the cabin of the floaters was destroyed, but they were allowed to take away their carpet bags and clothing upon promise being given to quit the business. Thirty-three gave the required promise and departed in peace. The raftmen are still under arms, determined to drive every floater from the creek .- Rep. of Saturday.
