BY AUTHORITY. RESOLUTION PROPOSING AMEND-OF THE COMMONWEALTH.

Resolved, by the Senate and House of Rep tatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, in General Assembly met: That the following amondments are proposed to the constitution of the commonwealth, in accordance with the provisions of the tenth article thereof.

FIRST AMENDMENT. There shall be an additional article to said constitution to be designated as article cleven, as fol-

OF PUBLIC DEBTS. Secrion 1. The State may contract debts, to supply casual deficits or failures in revenues, or to meet expenses not otherwise provided for; but the aggregate amount of such dobts direct and contingent, whether contracted by virtue of one or more acts of the general assembly, or at different periods of time, shall never exceed seven hundred and fifty thousand dollars, and the money arising from the creation of such debts, shall be applied to the purpose for which it was obtained or to reto the purpose for which it was obtained, or to re-pay the debts so contracted, and to no other pur-pose whatever.

Section 2. In addition to the above limited power, the State may contract debts to repel invasion, suppress insurrection, defend the State in war, or to redeem the present outstanding indebtedness of the State; but the money arising from the con-tracting of such debts, shall be applied to the purpose for which it was raised, or to repay such debts, and to no other purpose whatever. Secrios 3. Except the debts above specified, in

sections one and two of this article, no debt whatever shall be created by, or on behalf of the State.
Section 4 To provide for the payment of the
present debt, and any additional debt contracted as aforesaid, the legislature shall, at its first ses-sion, after the adoption of this amendment, create a sinking fund, which shall be sufficient to pay the accruing interest on such debt, and annually to reduce the principal thereof by a sum not less than two hundred and fifty thousand dollars; which sinking fund shall consist of the net annual income of the public works, from time to time owned by the State, or the proceeds of the sale of the same, or any part thereof, and of the income or proceeds of sale of stocks owned by the State. together with other funds, or resources, that may be designated by law. The said sinking fund may be increased, from time to time, by assigning to it any part of the taxes, or other revenues of the State, not required for the ordinary and current expenses of government, and unless in ease of war, invasion or insurrection, no part of the said sinking fund shall be used or applied otherwise than in extinguishment of the public debt, until the amount of such debt is reduced below the sum of five millions of dollars.

Section 5. The credit of the commonwealth shall not in any manner, or event, be pledged, or loaned to, any individual, company, corporation, or association; nor shall the commonwealth hereafter become a joint owner, or stockholder, in any company, association, or corporation.

Section 6. The commonwealth shall not assume the debt, or any part thereof, of any county, city, borough, or township; or of any corporation, or association; unless such debt shall have been contracted to enable the State to repel invasion, sup-press domestic insurrection, defend itself in time of war, or to assist the State in the discharge of any portion of its present indebtedness. Secretor 7. The legislature shall not authorize

any county, city, borough, township, or incorpora-ted district, by virtue of a vote of its citizens, or otherwise, to become a stockholder in any company, association, or corporation; or to obtain money for, or loan its credit to, any corporation, association, institution, or party.

SECOND AMENDMENT. There shall be an additional article to said constitution, to be designated as article XII., as fol-

OF NEW COUNTIES.

No county shall be divided by a line cutting off over one-tenth of its population, (either to form a new county or otherwise,) without the express assent of such county, by a vote of the electors thereof; nor shall any new county be established, con-taining less than four hundred square miles.

THIRD AMENDMENT. From section two of the first article of the constitution, strike out the words, "of the city of Philadelphia, and of each county respectively; from section five, same article, strike out the words. "of Philadelphia and of the several counties;" from section seven, same article, strike out the words, "neither the city of Philadelphia nor any," insert in lieu thereof the words, "and no;" strike out section four, same article, and in lieu

thereof insert the following:
Section 4. In the year one thousand eight hun dred and sixty-four, and in every seventh year thereafter, representatives to the number of one hundred, shall be apportioned and distributed equally, throughout the state, by districts in proportion to the number of texts. portion to the number of taxable inhabitants in the several parts thereof; except that any county containing at least three thousand five hundred taxables, may be allowed a separate representation; but no more than three counties shall be joined, and no county shall be divided, in the for-mation of a district. Any city containing a suffi-cient number of taxables to entitle it to at least two representatives, shall have a separate repre-sentation assigned it, and shall be divided into convenient districts of contiguous territory, of

equal taxable population as near as may be, each of which districts shall elect one representative." At the end of section seven, same article, insert these words, "the city of Philadelphia shall be di-vided into single senatorial districts, of contiguous territory as nearly equal in transile population as possible; but no ward shall be divided in the

The legislature, at its first session, after the a option of this amendment, shall divide the city of Philadelphia into senatorial and representative districts, in the manner above provided; such distriets to remain unchanged until the apportionment in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-four.

FOURTH AMENDMENT. There shall be an additional section to the first

article of said constitution, which shall be numbered and read as follows: Secriox 26. The legislature shall have the power to alter, revoke, or annul any charter of incor-poration hereafter conferred by, or under, any special, or general law, whenever in their opinion t may be injurious to the citizens of the commonwealth; in such manner, however, that no injus-tice shall be done to the corporators.
