AWFUL FATE .- Mr. Watt, recently a prisoher in the dungeons of the infamous "Bomba" King of Naples has been released. His government (British) interfered in his case and soon brought him out. He tells some of the "secrets of his prison house" and represents the prison as presenting a strange and ghastly spectacle. The European Times, of March 26, publishes Watt's account of this den of wretchedness from which we gather the following:

"The prisoners, about 350 in number, are the prime of manhood if suffering and the dungeon had not effectually done their work. They were pale and emaciated-they all had sunken eyes and prominent cheek bones-they resemble a crowd of animated corpses rather than living and breathing human beings. There was presented by them all a uniform expression of countenance, as if a common suffering had affixed on their shrinking faces and pinched features a common impression. Some he remarked to be without shirts; others were affected with repulsive looking skin diseases; and all were loaded with pediculi.
