PROCEEDINGS OF COURT-MAY T. 1858. David Adams vs. Geo. B. Engle's .Adm'rs .-This was an action of covenant, upon two ar- Isaac Bloom, jr., ticles of agreement made in 1839 and 1841, for George W.Long, the sale of land and forge property from Adams to Engle. After the trial had been commenced, the Plaintiff took a non-suit, and the jury was discharged .- Linn and Wallace for Piff. ; Hale and McEnally for the Defts.

H. F. Rider & wife vs. Ehza Irvin .- Action of trespass for goods belonging to Mrs. Rider, which it was alleged the Deft. had taken and retained. Verdict for Plffs. for \$215,00 .--McEnally for Plffs. ; Wallace for Deft.

C. P. Hinds vs. George Mason .- Action of partition for land which plaintiff alleged that the and defendant held together. Deft. denied that they held in common, and alleged that his own possession was adverse to that of the plaintiff. After hearing the evidence, the Plff. suffered a non-suit .- Swoope for plaintifl; Wallace for defendant.

Samuel Ritter vs. Hurxthal & Brother .- Action of assumpsit for a balance of about \$350,00 claimed to be due to plaintiff for mill-wright work in building a grist-mill for defts. in 1852. The defence set up was that the work was not done according to contract, but in a defective and unworkmanlike manner. Verdict for defendants .- Swoope for Plff. ; McEnally for Defendants.

Thomas B. Davis vs. James McCracken and Matthew Bloom .- . Action of debt on bond given during the pendency of a former action of ejectment to allow the removal of timber from the land then in dispute. Verdict for Plff. for \$34,29 .- McEnally for plaintiff; Wallace for Defendants.

Commonwealth vs. Henry Sovers .- Indictment for fornication and bastardy. Trued and verdict rendered of guilty. McCullough, Swoope and McEnally for the Com'th; Curtin and Linn for deft.

[After his trial, but before sentence was prononneed, Sowers made his escape.]

Commonwealth vs. Daniel Moore,-Indictment for obtaining money under false pretences. Tried and verdict of guilty. Deft. sentenced to pay fine of \$2,01 and costs and to be imprisoned 10 days .- McCullough for Com'th; Swoope for Deft.

Licenses were granted to nearly all applicants. The Court held that under the late law they had no right to refuse where the person applying had complied with its provisions. A large amount of other business, which did not come before a Jury, was disposed of

by the Court. The court adjourned on Thursday morning, the 20th, having been kept busy about 2 days.
