## County Meeting.

WORTH TRYING -We have recently seen mention made in some of the papers that rotten wood applied freely to growing potatoes would have the effect of preventing rot in the potatoes. If this is the case, it seems to us that tan-bark, which can be more readily procured, would make a good substitute and produce similar results. In conversing about the matter a few days since with one of our farmers, he mentioned that one of our citizens had used tan bark on his potato-patch last seasoe, and upon inquiring of the latter he informed us that the crop was r nusually productive and entirely free from rot. Whether the application of the tan-bark produced these effects, is a question which a few experiments would soon decide.

DROWNED .- On last Wednesday, two men, named Conner and Summerville, were drowned at Chest Falls, this county, by being thrown from a raft into the river. A large spar floating about, had got into the course, ahead of the raft, and when the raft struck, four of the six men on it were thrown off, two of whom were rescued, but the two named above found a watery grave. Conner was a married man and leaves a wife and couple children; Summerville was a single man. At last accounts, the bodies of the unfortunate men had not been recovered.

Sroam .- On last Thursday night, a portion of our county was visited by a heavy rain storm, accompanied by thunder and lightning. In the neighborhood of Curwensville it was most severe. The grain and corn fields are much washed, gardens injured, and quite a number of trees were blown down in the woods, obstructing the roads in some places.
