PEOPLE's JUBILEE .- A large number of the members of the People's party, full of enthusiasm, and feeling as if they had good reason to srejoice and be exceeding giad" over the result of the recent election in this State, assembled in our town on last Wednesday evening, and had a regular "jubilee." Our Curwensville brethren came down in strong force, accompanied by the Saxe-Horn and Martial bands of that place, which were joined by the martial band of our borough, and together made "considerable, if not more," music. At about 7 o'clock, the crowd collected in front of the Raftsman's Journal office, when H. B. Swoope, Esq., was called upon and responded in an appropriate speech. A number of torches, (the pitch-pine for which our friend Jacob Irwin had furnished us,) had been prepared, and after lighting them, a procession was formed, and headed by the "stars and stripes" and the several bands of music, marched around town and finally halted in the Diamond, where several tar-barrels and other combustible materials had been set on fire and illuminated that portion of the town. After having "a good time" of it generally, the crowd about 11 o'clock dispersed in high glee and the best of humor.

Is JAIL .- On last Saturday night, two men, John B. Witters and John Finney, were lodged in our county jail, charged with robbing the store of David McGhehan, about a mile from Ansonville, this county, sometime in September. The robbers had carried off flannels, calicoes, shoes, &c., amounting in value to perhaps \$100. At the time the robbery was committed, we believe, arrests had been made without however implicating any one, and the matter passed along until a few days since, when Mr. McGhehan was returning home from Pittsburg, when a man came to him on the cars, mentioned him by name, and inquired whether he had found his goods. Receiving a negative answer, the stranger said if he would go to Witters' he would find his goods, and immediately left the car, nor did Mr. M. see him again. Acting upon this suggestion, he procured a warrant, and upon search found a number of the articles in the house of Witters. The prisoners were brought to town by Constable Hegarty; Peter Bloom and Peter Mays, between 12 and 1 o'clock.
