SNOW.—The weather clerk, it would seem, has made a sad jumble of things this season. In March he gave us mild and pleasant weather—sun-shine and calm. Now, in the middle of April, he has taken it into his contrary "moodle" to send us cold and chilly winds, and even snow, a sufficient quantity of which fell yesterday morning to cover the ground, and make this region present quite a winter-like appearance.

FIRE.—About a week or ten days ago, a house on land of David Cathcart, in Knox township, this county, was destroyed by fire. It had been occupied by Mr. Wallace Dunlap, who was about removing to Brady, and was absent at the time. His wife and one or two other females were present, and managed to remove the contents, but were unable to save the building, the fire having broken out at the roof. We do not know what the loss will amount to.

ACCIDENT.—We are informed, that on Tuesday last week, 12th inst., C. Z. McCullough of Lawrence township, received a severe cut from an axe in the hands of another person, whilst engaged in rafting. The person was driving a pin and the axe accidentally glanced, and struck Mr. McCullough on the side of the left foot, cutting a gash several inches in length, and severing an artery. The wound bled profusely for several hours and was very painful, but is now healing fast.

IN JAIL.—On last Friday afternoon, 15th inst., A. J. Hays, and Owen M'Govern, were lodged in jail for robbing the store of John P. Rider, in Covington township, on the night of the 14th. Suspicion having attached to Hays, a warrant was issued, on which he was arrested and brought before P. A. Gaulin, Esq. On examination he confessed the theft, delivered up a portion of the goods, and implicated M'Govern as an accomplice—and the leader in the robbery. M'Govern, however, denies having any knowledge of the affair. Hays was tried last fall for robbing M'Gehan's store, but was cleared. How he will fare this time remains to be seen.

ROBBERY.—In the latter part of the past week, the store of Hon. Wm. L. Moore, in Clearfield Borough, was robbed of \$140.00—\$116.00 in gold and \$24.00 in silver. The money was taken out of the safe, which contained some \$800.00 more, of paper money. The robbery was committed by a party or parties, who were not seen.

ANDERSON'S CREEK P. B. & N. CO.

An Act to incorporate the Anderson's Creek Public Road and Navigation Company.

SECTION 1. Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania in General Assembly met and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same, That John Patton, Benjamin Hartshorn, James Spencer, Samuel Arnold, David Dressler, William F. Johnston, David Kirk, Wilson Moore and William M'Bride, or a majority of them, all of the county of Clearfield and State of Pennsylvania, are hereby appointed commissioners to do and perform the several things hereinafter provided for, viz., to open books, receive subscriptions and title of the Anderson's Creek public road and navigation company, with power to construct a public road from the mouth of Anderson's creek up said creek, by the best and most convenient route, as far as Moore's mill on the main branch, and as far as David Irvin's mill on the other branch, all of which will be in the county of Clearfield and in relation to the organization of said company, it shall be subject to all the restrictions and have the benefit of all the provisions contained in the first, second, third, fourth, fifth, sixth, seventh, eighth and nineteenth sections of the act, entitled, "An Act regulating turnpike and plank road companies," passed the twenty-sixth day of January one thousand eight hundred and forty-nine so far as the same are not inconsistent with the following provisions of this act.

SECTION 2. That the capital stock of said company shall consist of two hundred and fifty shares of twenty dollars each.

SECTION 3. That said company shall have the privilege of using and occupying twenty-five feet on each side of the centre line of said road, but shall not be compelled to open for use more than twelve feet wide of the same.

SECTION 4. That said company shall have full power to enter upon and improve the ascending navigation of Anderson's creek, by cutting away and clearing out of the bed of the stream, at least one inch in each year, all of the brush, timber, roots, &c., so that saw logs and square timber may be floated up said stream as far up as the upper terminus of said road above mentioned.

SECTION 5. That for the purpose of locating and constructing said road and of improving the bed of the stream, the company are authorized to enter upon the land adjacent thereto and take wood, gravel and other materials for that purpose, doing no unnecessary damage to private property and subject to the payment for such materials, as provided for by the general road laws, namely, the act approved the twenty-sixth January, one thousand eight hundred and forty-nine.

SECTION 6. That as soon as said road shall be opened for travelling, the company are hereby authorized to ask, demand and receive the following tolls for the use of said road, to wit: Twenty cents per thousand for shingles, twenty-five cents per thousand for boards (each such demand to be made in advance), and for measure, and eight dollars for every raft of square timber not exceeding in quantity six thousand cubic feet hauled over said road or over any part of it, and for all other kinds of travelling on said road the same rates of toll as the Susquehanna and Waterford turnpike road company were allowed to charge by their original charter.

SECTION 7. That said company shall have a right to demand and receive from any and every person using the said stream for the purpose of running, or floating lumber across its waters, the sum of twenty cents per thousand, board measure, for all lumber put in said stream, the company may at their option demand in advance the payment of said toll, or security for the same, and in all cases where they do so, the persons from whom such demand is made shall be considered and treated as trespassers, if they use or attempt to use said stream without first paying or securing to the satisfaction of the company the toll so demanded.

SECTION 8. That the said company may require from the persons using said stream, a statement of the amount of lumber put in the stream to be floated down, and the said persons are hereby required within ten days after such demand, to furnish such statement, on failure to furnish said statement, or upon statement when furnished, being shown to be wilfully wrong, it shall be lawful for the company to recover treble the amount of tolls authorized by this act for the actual amount of lumber put in the stream.

SECTION 9. That the said company, shall have power to sue for and recover the tolls, authorized by this act, as debts of like amount and now recoverable by law.

SECTION 10. That all tolls for the use of the navigation, shall be payable if no demand for the same be made in advance, to the treasurer, at his office in the borough of Curwensville, within ten days after the lumber shall have been started in said stream, and on failure to make such payment, the party in default shall forfeit and pay double the usual rates of toll.

SECTION 11. That in all judgments rendered for toll, under this act, the defendant shall not be entitled to the benefit of the act of ninth of April, one thousand eight hundred and forty-nine.

SECTION 12. That any person or persons, wilfully obstructing in any manner, said road or stream, after either shall have been opened, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof, shall be fined and imprisoned to the discretion of the court.

SECTION 13. That the annual meeting of said company, for the purpose of electing officers, shall be on the first Monday in July of each year, and the board of officers first elected, shall only hold their offices until the first succeeding annual meeting.
