FIRE .- We regret to learn that on last Monday, during the absence of Mr. Lawrence Flood from home, his tavern house on Sandy, in Covington township, was destroyed by fire. He had just procured new furniture, bedding, &c., and laid in a large stock of provisions, all of which were consumed. His loss will be from \$1,500 to \$2,000.

Row, of Clearfield, and Lucius Rodgers of McKean Co., were selected, (with the concurrence of the other counties,) as Representative delegates to the State Convention, and the selection of Hon. Samuel Calvin on the part of Blair county, as Senatorial Delegate, concurred in. On motion, a committee of seven was appointed to report to the next meeting a plan for perfecting and keeping up the organization of the party in Clearfield county, viz :- J. B. Mc-Enally, S. B. Row, Wm. McBride, Michael A. Frank, Jas. E. Watson, Wm. Irvin and Phillip Antes. On motion, the meeting adjourned to meet on Wednesday evening of the June Court, in the Court House in Clearfield.
