THE FROST .- We have been making inquiries concerning the crops in this county, and are satisfied that, though the damage done by the frost of the 4th June is considerable, it is not as great as was supposed at first. Some of 000 rifles, which will cost 10,000,000 francs. the frost-bitten wheat and rye fields are beginning to show signs of reviving; others are not injured as much as was anticipated; and hopes are entertained that, though half the grain may be destroyed, we will have as large a yield in Clearfield as we had last year.
