In the course of three and a half years 270,000 trees were felled in order to get at the gutta-percha.

The eyes of needles are punctured by a machine which, superintended by one boy, can punch 20,000 in a day.

Every pound of cochineal contains 70,000 insects boiled to death; 700,000 pounds are annually used for scarlet and crimson dyes.

A ray of artificial light travels at the rate of 70,000 leagues in a second of time. Astronomers have given the rate of solar light at 192,500 miles a second.

In the formation of a single locomotive engine there are over 5,000 pieces to be put together, and these require to be as accurately adjusted as the works of a watch.
