If the rider falls upon the ground, his horse remains beside him, and neighs until assistance is brought. The Kochlani are neither large nor handsome, but amazingly swift; the whole race is divided into several families, each of which has its proper name. Some of these have a higher reputation than others, on account of their more ancient and uncontaminated nobility .-Niebuhy.
