Resolved, That the enactments of State Legislatures to defeat the faithful execution of the Fugitivo Slave Law are hostile in character, subversive of the Constitution, and revolutionary in their

Resolved, That it is the duty of the Federal Government to protect, when necessary, the rights of person and property on the high seas, in the Territories, or wherever else its constitutional au-

thority extends.

Resolved, That the Democracy of the nation recognize it as the imperative duty of this Govern-ment to protect the naturalized citizen in all his rights, whether at home or in foreign lands, to the same extent as its native-born citizens.

THE DRED SCOTT DECISION. In the 19th vol. of Howard's Reports, page 365. it is stated that the Supreme Court of the United States decided in the Dred Scott case as follows: 1st. "The Territory thus acquired is acquired by the people of the U.S. for their common and equal benefit, through their agent and trustee, the Federal Government. Congress can exercise no power over the rights of persons or property of a citizen in the Territory which is prohibited by the Constitution. The Government and the citizen, whenever the Territory is open to settlement, both

limited by the Constitution.' 2nd. "Congress has no right to prohibit citizens of any particular State or States from taking up their home there, while it permits citizens of other States to do so. Nor has it a right to give privileges to one class of citizens which it refuses to another. The Territory is acquired for their equal and common benefit, and if open to any it must be open to all upon equal and the same

4th. "The Constitution of the United States rec-

5th. "The act of Congress, therefore, prohibiting a citizen of the United States taking with him his slaves when he removes to the Territory in question to reside, is an exercise of authority over private property which is not warranted by the Con-stitution, and the removal of the plaintiff by his owner to that Territory gave him no title to free-

6th. "While it remains a Territory Congress oth. "While it remains a Territory Congress may legislate over it within the scope of its constitutional powers in relation to citizens of the United States, and may establish a Territorial Government, and the form of this local government must be regulated by the discretion of Congress; but with powers not exceeding those which Congress itself by the Constitution is authorized to exercise over citizens of the United States in respect to their rights of property." their rights of property.'
