nish the committee a statement signed by himself under a pledge of veracity, of the quantity of grain raised on the ground entered for a premium-and he shall state as correctly as he can the kind and condition of the previous crops-the kind and quantity of seed used, and the time and mode of

putting it in the ground.

4. It is the object of the society to grant premiums for good, not extravagant and generally impracticable culture, and any wilful inaccuracy in the statement furnished as above shall deprive the applicant of a right to compete for future premiums.
