The water in the Alabama rivers is lower than it has been known for years before. Navigation for even the lightest draught boats is very difficult.

Reliable information had reached Kanaguwa, Japan, that a town of 10,000 inhabitants, some two hundred miles distant, had been swallowed by an earthquake. Shocks were telt at Kanaguwa during May and June.

Garibaldi was fifty-three years old on the 19th of last July. On that night there was a general illumination in Naples in honor of the event. The ministers of Government made a funny mistake. so at the rooms of the committee. 3. Applicants applying for premiums shall furnish the committee a statement signed by himself under a pledge of veracity, of the quantity of grain raised on the ground entered for a premium-and he shall state as correctly as he can the kind and condition of the previous crops-the kind and quantity of seed used, and the time and mode of putting it in the ground.

4. It is the object of the society to grant premiums for good, not extravagant and generally impracticable culture, and any wilful inaccuracy in the statement furnished as above shall deprive the applicant of a right to compete for future premiums
