EDITOR :- In late issues of your valuable Journal we find an advertisement of the socalled Clearfield County Bible Society, informing us where we can buy Bibles and where donations will be received, but the principal object for which Bible societies are formed is overlooked. They do not tell us where a Bible can be got for gratuitous distribution, or what agency they have in operation for supplying the poor and the destitute with the word of life. It is now about fiteen years since the county has been canvassed, and we frequently meet with families that have no Bibles in their houses. Now, the responsibility of this state of affairs rests upon the counly society, for the parent society was formed for the purpose of supplying the whole State, and then the county society steps in and takes upon itself the moral obligation to perform the duties of the State society, so far as this county is concerned ; and it is no excuse that they have not the funds, for if they make known to the parent society that there is destitution which they cannot supply, that society will supply the deficiency. But we believe the lib-erality of the people of this county will prevent the necessity of calling on the parent society, if they see the money going to the proper purpose; yet, liberal as they are, we are much mistaken if they donate money to keep up a book store in Clearfield Borough.
