Horace Bishop, one of the patriots of the Revolution, died in Michigan last week, in the 100th year of his age. He served four years in the Revolutionary war, and was one of the guard who stood sentry over Major Andre at the time of his execution.

Mr. Wendell received one hundred and thirty thousand dollars from the Treasury department for the purchase of his printing bureau, which is now under the entire control of the Government, and will be operated on a new and more economical system.
