vian bark, however, is a costly medicine, and as the army is likely to make a large demand for the article, and raise its price, the possession of another remedy, if effectual, may be considered as an important acquisition. A genileman, who has lately been among our troops on the Upper Potomac, where the "ague" is quite prevalent, says that an extract of the common white plaintain, made by steeping the leaves in whiskey, and taken before breakfast, a dozen mornings in succession, is even more certain than quinine in curing the laver. We are not able to judge of the virtue of this plant as a remedial agent in any disease whatever, but If it is what it is described to be, it has the merit of cheapness, as it is said to be at every farm-house door.

COFFEE, SUGAR AND TEA .-- Our citizens are aware that the prices of these necessary articles, have rapidly advanced of late. This is not warranted by searcity, nor by the modertie tax which will soon be laid by the Government upon them . but is caused by action on the part of speculators, which journals everywhere should expose. The New York correspondent of the Philadelphia Ledger in alluding to this subject, says :-- A very active speculalive movement in coffee, sugar and tea, has been in progress here for some time past, the effect of which has been to run up the prices of these almost necessaries of life to a figure which places them quite beyond the reach of those who have the most need of them-the poor. In anticipation of the increased duty to which these commodities will soon be subject, the speculators have bought, or are buying up and placing in store, the surplus stock on hand, in the expectation of commanding their own prices for them. Even now, the commonest qualities of brown sugar cannot be purchased at retail at less than 121 cents per pound, which is an increase of one hundred per cent. upon prices current for the same quality a month ago. The advance on coffee and tea is not so enormous, but it is sufficient to limit consumption to a very perceptible extent, and to make the working class realize the necessity of abandoning their use. The moderate tax imposed by the Government upon these articles, will be borne in the same patriotic spirit of self-sacrifice which has characterized our people from the beginning of the war, but it is questionable whether as much can be said in regard to the speculators who are thus taking advantage of the necessi. ties of Government to add to the burthens of selves.

attending their wounded comrades after the battle of Stone Bridge; and with the others taken prisoners, were stripped of every article but those altimately required by decency. and in this condition were sent to Richmond, consuming forty-eight hours on the way, packed into baggage cars with other prisoners as

full as they could stand. At Richmond they were put into the tobacco factory or prison hospital. There the Confederate surgeons, as might be expected, attended to the rebel wounded first, and afterwards to our own men, who were not, however, treated with any undue severity of practice. The rebel surgeons in general, as may unfortunately be remarked of many who attended our own regiments, are singularly incompetent, and display, to a degree proportionately increased, the same reckless love of carving for carving's sake, which is to often manifested in our own municipal ho-pitals. Many limbs were sacrificed by the knife, simply on account of comminuted fractures, where they might easily have been saved, and many more were allowed to remain unsunputsted which should have comp off, because the shell ragments they had received had not broken bones. Of these latter cases the great number died-sinking into a slow typhoid state from the wide destruction of tissues the shells had produced without implicating the bone. Singularly enough, neither in the general nor the prison hospitals did any cases occur after the Stone Bridge battle of high inflam-

matory affections supervening upon wounds. There was no erysipelas-no hospital gangrene. All the deaths occurred rather from low than high inflammation. It was a common practice for the rebel sen-

tries to fire at the windows of the prison containing the loyal captives. One man, already mentioned in our despatches, was killed in this way-another was seriously wounded through the leg, without even putting his | at his store room in Philipsburg Centreycounty, a head out of the window.

reached when the sentry fired into the window of the hospital. Fortunately no one was killed, but the ball passed three feet over the head of the dying bed of one of our wounded, and went out at the ward door behind him. After these little escapades of the sentries, an officer generally came over from Beauregard to tell the surgeons it was a mistake. In one ward a single physician was left to take care (without assistance) of more than one hundred and fifty patients. Lint, bandages, sponges; all hospital appliances were very scant, but in general were shared between the rebel and Union wounded with more generosity than might have been expected.
