CAMP NEAR FREDERICKSBURG, VA. May 19th, 1862. MR. Epiron :- The 5th Regiment Penna. Reserves, to which the Clearfield Company belongs, is at present located near the Freder icksburg and Richmond railway, and about three miles from the first named place. We arrived here on the 11th May, after a three day's march, from Catlett Station. . . . I

our reaching the railroad, on our way to Mapasses, some time since. We had to remain all night at the station, and shift the best way we could for lodging. An old wagon-bed served me that night for a bedstead. The night being very cold I placed it, perhaps, nearer the fire than I should have done for my own personal safety; at least, when I awoke in the morning, the greater part of the cape of my overcoat had disappeared. . . . The country, since we left the Potomac, has assumed a far different aspect. The boys often

said, if there was no better land in the Old Dominion than what they had seen, (both in the Western part and around Camp Pierpont.) they did not think the State worth fighting for. But since we have come here, they have nearly all changed their minds in regard to Old Dixie; and I have heard them frequently say, "that they would not mind if Uncle Sam would give each of them a farm in this section as soon as the war is over."

Fredericksburg is a town of nearly 10, 000 inhabitants, and contains some very fine buildings. The churches in particular attract the attention of the soldiers-not, on account of a very great desire to attend preaching-but because they are the most prominent of all other edifices. Opposite Fredericksburg is Falmouth, a small town, which offers but little of interest to a stranger.
