The petition of Hannah Mains respectfully represents, that her husband Jonas Mains enlisted in the service of the United States, and is now in the army, that she has a claim for relief under the Act of Assembly in such cases made and provided; but, as she is in formed and believes the officers, viz : the Associate Judges and Commissioners, designated in the said Act of Assembly as a Relief Board, have never met as they are required to do by the said Act of Assembly-therefore she prays your honor that a rule may be granted upon the said Judges and Commissioners to show cause why they should not meet as such Relief Board, under the Act of Assembly. And she will pray, &c. HANNAH C. MAIN.

Answer of Commissioners. To the Honorable the Judges of the Court of Common Pleas of Clearfield County :

The answer and return of Jacob Kuntz and Samuel C. Thompson, Commissioners of the County of Clearfield, to the petition of Hannah C. Mains, Humbly sheweth,

That they are desirous to obey the laws of the land, but are not advised that the levying of a tax, and meeting as a Relief Board under the provisions of the Act of-1861, were compulsory duties upon them; but believed, and still do believe and insist, that the imposition of a relief tax upon the people of the county, was optional with them, and left to their sound discretion, but would have not hesitated to lay and collect such tax to appropriate to all meritorious cases, in the county, but for reasons peculiar to the situation of the financial matters of the county, among which is the fact that a heavy load of debt and griev ous taxation are just now imposed upon the people of the county, by reason of the erection of a new Court Hous :-- that in the past year the people of the county have subscribed a large amount of money to a relief fund, to wit: the sum of \$3,500, or there bouts, which moneys have been disbursed by a committee of citizens to all worthy objects-these mon eys have not all been expended in relief donations, and that but two applications have been made to the Board of Commissioners for a relief out of the county funds-that those cases were relieved out of the private means of citizens and your respondents.

INTERNAL REVENUE .- Below we give a letter of instructions in reference to the purchase of "Internal Revenue Stamps":

OFFICE OF INTERNAL REVENUE, Sept'r 17th, 1862.-Revenue stamps may be ordered from this office in quantities to suit the purchasers. Orders should cover remittances of Treasury Notes, or an original certificate of a United States Assistant Treasurer, or designated depository, of a deposit made for the purchase of stamps. The following commission payable in stamps, will be allowed: On purchases of \$50 or more, 2 per centum; on \$100, 3 per cent.; on \$500, 4 per cent.; on \$1,000, 5 per cent. In sending orders for stamps it should be remembered that every stamp expresses upon its face its kind as well as its denomination, and that each stamp must be used for the purpose thus specified, and for no other. For instance : check stamps must be used for checks alone; contract stamps only for contracts, &c., &c. Revenue stamps will be ready for delivery on the 22d instant. Every correspondent is requested to give the State, as well as town and county, of his residence. If not otherwise instructed, the stamps will be transmitted by mail.

PROCLAMATION FROM THE PRESIDENT. / WHEREAS, It has become necessary to call into service not only volunteers but also portions of the militia of the states, by draft, in order to suppress the insurrection existing in the United States, and disloyal parties are not adequately restrained, by the ordinary processes of law, from bindering this measure, and from giving aid and comfort, in various ways, to the insurrection :

Now Therefore, Be It Ordered : First, That during the existing insurrection.

and as a necessary measure for suppressing the same, that all rebels and insurgents, their aiders and abettors, within the United States, and all persons discouraging volunteer enlistments, resisting the militia drafts, or guilty of disloyal parties, affording aid and comfort to the rebellion against the authority of the United States, shall be subject to martial law, and liable to trial and punishment by courts martial or military commission.

Second, That the writ of habeas corpus is suspended in respect to all persons arrested, or who are now or may hereafter, during the rebellion, be imprisoned in any tort, camp, arsinal, military prison, or other place of confinement by any military authority, or by the sentence of any court-martial or military commis-
