A JOINT RESOLUTION PROPOSING CERTAIN AMENDMENTS TO THE CONSTITUTION.—Be it resolved by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania in General Assembly met. That the following amendments be proposed to the Constitution of the Commonwealth, in accordance with the provisions of the tenth article thereof:

Thereshall be an additional section to the third article of the Constitution, to be designated as section four, as follows:

Section four, as follows:
Section 4. Whenever any of the qualified electors of this Commonwealth shall be in any actual military service, under a requisition from the President of the United States, or by the authority of this Commonwealth, such electors may exercise the right of suffrage in all elections by the citithe right of suffrage in all elections by the clu-zens, under such regulations as are, or shall be, prescribed by law, as fully as if they were pres-ent at their usual place of election.

There shall be two additional sections to the eleventh article of the Constitution, to be desig-

nated as sections eight, and nine, as follows:
SECTION 8. No bill shall be passed by the Legislature, containing more than one subject, which shall be clearly expressed in the title, except ap propriation bills.

SECTION 9. No bill shall be passed by the Legislature granting any powers, or privileges, in any case, where the authority to grant such powers. or privileges, has been, or may hereafter be, con-ferred upon the courts of this Commonwealth. JOHN CESSNA,
