\$300 BOUNTY.—By reference to our Advertising columns, it will be seen that the Commissioners of Clearfield county, have increased the county bounty to \$300. Now is the time to enlist.

POSTPONED.—Persons interested will take notice that the sale of the personal property of Joshua J. Tate, deceased, will take place on Tuesday the 19th day of April, instead of Friday the 8th—having been postponed on account of the prospect of a flood.

Districts liable to Draft should apply immediately to A. M. Hills to have their quotas filled—or so near at least as will place them safely beyond the draft, or else they will have their share of the taxes to pay, without receiving any benefit of the County bounty.

LEWIS LIDDELL.—We neglected to state the fact, last week, that Lieut. Thos. Liddell of Co. E, 149th Penn. Volunteers, was home on a short furlough. The Lieutenant looks exceedingly well, and seems to enjoy a soldier's life. We wish him a safe return to his friends, when this war is over.

SENATOR WALLACE AND THE SOLDIERS' VOTE.—The last issue of the Copperhead organ contains the labored effort of Senator Wallace in opposition to the passage of the amendments to the Constitution allowing the soldiers to vote. We have not space this week to refer to this document, but will endeavor to present our readers with an abstract of it on some future occasion.

THE LARIMER MONUMENT.—We have seen a letter from Capt. A. M. Smith stating that he had raised \$142, for the Larimer monument, among the men of the regiment to which the gallant Major belonged. It will be remembered the subscriptions were not to exceed one dollar each. What are the people at home doing? The members of the Committee should take their subscription papers down the river with them, and afford the money-making lumbermen an opportunity to subscribe.

RAFTING AND THE WEATHER.—In our last issue we noticed the fact that snow had fallen to the depth of about six inches, when we went to press. It did not cease snowing until it had reached nearly a foot in depth—a great portion of which, however, passed off so gradually as to cause but little rise in the streams. But during the past two days, the rains have reached a moderate running stage and quite a number of rafts have passed this place—some of which, we understand, rubbled on the bars. Some rain has fallen during the last sixteen hours, and this (Wednesday) morning there is a good flood in the river at this place, with a fair prospect of continuing for several days.

HORRIBLE CATASTROPH.—Towards the close of last week a raft was discovered on fire while passing down the river in the vicinity of Northumberland. Some persons from shore reached the raft as soon as possible, when they found three men on board, one of them burned to a crisp, and the others to insensibility. Being thus far gone, they could give no account of themselves, their names, nor anything concerning the disaster. It is supposed that the straw and other inflammable materials lying loosely about in the cabin took fire while they were asleep, or, what is more lamentable, intoxicated. The two living men were not expected to recover, at latest accounts.—Union County Star, March 22, 1864.

The War Department refuses to grant passes for visitors to the Potomac army.

A general congress of Freemasons of all countries is shortly to assemble at Leipzig.

Some benevolent citizens are about to establish a home for Newsboys in the city of Pittsburgh.

The New Brunswick papers are lamenting the increasing emigration of young men from that province to the United States.

Gen. Grant has established his headquarters ten miles nearer the front than Gen. Meade has ever done. That looks like work.

Gov. Curtin, in a letter to the Subsistence committee of Pittsburgh, expresses his sincere thanks for the relief that has been extended to our soldiers on passing through that city.

Gold was selling in Richmond last week at the rate of thirty par dollars for one in gold or silver, which is about three thousand per cent. So the rebel Government has little to gain by repudiating, or the people little to lose.

The Masonic Lodge at Chattanooga has revived and will soon commence work. That looks like reconstruction.

Deacon John Phillips of Starbridge will be 104 years old the 20th of next June, and has never been severely sick since he was 14 years of age. He was chosen father in the place of his father, in 1790.

Charles Noyes, who robbed the United States Express company, at St. Louis, last summer of \$600,000, has been sentenced to seven years confinement in the penitentiary for burglary, and three for grand larceny.

The finding of the Court of Inquiry in the case of Gen. McCook is published. It says he committed "a mistake" in leaving the battle field of Chickamauga; but excuses him, because he but followed General Rosecrans, who had gone before him to Chattanooga.
