THE ROADS.—The roads, in this region, are unusually bad this spring, in consequence of the snow and rain that fell after the frost was out of the ground.

BRIDGE LOST.—We understand that, on Friday last, some fifteen or eighteen rafts broke loose below Butternut Falls, and went adrift. This quite a heavy loss to the owners.

"SUBPOENA SUR DIVORCE."—The Commissioners to take testimony in the case of Marks vs. Marks, has extended the time to April 28th. In the case, Elder vs. Elder, the time has been extended to April 29th.

THE FLOOD.—The waters were too high for safe running on Saturday, Sunday and Monday, but since then a great many rafts have passed down. The streams are still at a good flood for rafting, and we presume, that most of the timber will be on its way to market within a few days.

THE APPOINTMENT.—According to the bill reported to the Senate, the Clearfield districts for Senator and Representative, are as follows: For Senator, the counties of Clearfield, Cameron, Clarion, Forest and Elk shall compose the 53d district, and elect one Senator; and for Representative, the counties of Clearfield and Elk are to elect one member. In what shape the bill will pass remains to be seen.

A boiler exploded, on Wednesday the 6th, in Southwork foundry, Phila., by which 7 persons were killed and 20 wounded.

Mrs. Lucretia Clay, widow of Henry Clay, died on the 6th at Lexington, Ky., aged 83 years.

The Sanitary Fair in New York is a grand success. The receipts up to Friday afternoon were \$563,163 19.

Counterfeit \$10 greenbacks, printed from genuine plates, but without stamps, are said to be in circulation in New York.

Late advices from Mattoon, Illinois, state that the Copperhead rioters have dispersed and that not a man can be found that will acknowledge himself one. So it will soon be everywhere.

The Freemasons' Hall and the Winthrop Hotel, in Boston, were destroyed by fire on Wednesday the 6th. Loss on the Hall about \$100,000, and on the hotel about \$50,000. The masons lost many valuable relics.

SALE OF SEATED LANDS FOR TAXES.—In pursuance of the provisions of an Act of Assembly, passed the 29th day of April, A. D. 1843, to provide for the collection of taxes on lands wherever no personal property can be found, and where the owner neglects or refuses to pay the taxes assessed thereon, the court house in Clearfield county, on the second Monday in June, A.
