On the evening of the 1st of April, 1864, at Martinsburg, Va., the employees of Capt. H. D. Patton, A. Q. M., presented him with a splendid gold watch and chain, valued at \$300, and bearing the following inscription: "Presented to Capt. H. D. Patton, A. Q. M., by his employees, as a slight token of esteem, April 1st, 1864."

The presentia was made by one of the clerks in his employ, in a neat and appropriate speech, to which the Captain responded in the following felicitous remarks:

GENTLEMEN—Your generosity has not only surprised my feelings, but has taken me by assault. I have not as command, the usual defence, a ready-made speech; I cannot make a speech; I never made a speech in my life; yet I cannot allow this occasion—one of the most happy and unexpected of any in my life, to pass without thanking each and all of you, for this glowing testimonial of your esteem—and to assure you that the gratitude my heart feels I am wholly unable to express in words, I shall wear the watch and chain with feelings of pleasure, and ever hold dear the memory of the donors. That's all!"

The affair passed off with a deal of pleasant and good feeling. Yours truly, T. E. K. Martinsburg, West Va., April 11, 1864.

Mrs. JANE IRVIN; President of Curwensville Ladies Soldiers' Relief Society. DEAR MADAM: I was a prisoner of war in Libby Prison, from June 15th, 1863, to March 21st, 1864. During that time our Government and Sanitary Commission sent a large amount of clothing and other stores to Richmond, for our prisoners there. The Confederate authorities appointed a committee to distribute those articles. I was one of that committee, and while discharging my duties as such, I came across a large box of sundries from the Ladies Soldiers' Relief Society of Curwensville; which I had the pleasure of distributing among the men, at that time (January) sick in General Hospital No. 21. The articles were received with thankful hearts, I assure you, and did good. The poor suffering men seemed to think that their kind friends in the North had not entirely forgotten them. Present my kind thanks to the Ladies of your Society for this favor, thus rendered to our needy men, confined within the enemy's lines.

The Fort Pillow Massacre.

The Committee to investigate the Fort Pillow butchery have taken 57 depositions, which more than confirm the newspaper accounts of the massacre. Among the witnesses who were examined is the negro who was burned alive. There is no doubt of the fact that one or more persons were nailed through their heads to pieces of wood, and then burnt alive. Not only on the day of the surrender were such fiendish acts perpetrated, but on the next day, in cold blood.

Evidence of the atrocious black-flag character of recent rebel victories is accumulating. Mr. Blow, Representative from Missouri, has a letter from R. S. Critchell, Acting Master of the steamer Silver Cloud, which stopped at Fort Pillow the day following the butchery. This letter confirms the worst that has been told. The writer says: "I saw several colored soldiers of the 6th U. S. Artillery with their eyes punched out with knives and bayonets also. Going up into the fort, I saw three bodies partially consumed by fire, whether burned before or after death I cannot say; anyway, there were several companies of Rebels in the fort while these bodies were burning, and they could have pulled them out of the fire had they chosen to do. One of the wounded negroes told me he hadn't done a thing, and when the rebels drove our men out of the fort they (our men) threw away their guns and cried out that they surrendered; but the Rebels kept on shooting them down until they shot all but a few. This is what they all say." The writer adds that "the Rebels burned some of the white dead."

In addition to this, we have the accounts that in a little while over our pickets at Niekajak, after they were captured, those who could not march fast enough to suit the Rebels were shot or stabbed to death and their pockets emptied and the clothing stripped off their warm bodies by "our Southern brethren."

The details of these massacres is enough to appal the coldest heart. What measure should be meted out to these offenders?

Statistics of Miscegenation.

There were 411,613 mulatto slaves in the South in 1860, of whom 69,979 were in Virginia, 43,281 in Kentucky, and 36,900 in Georgia. These numbers are considerably beyond the legitimate proportion of those States. There were also 176,739 free mulattoes in the United States in 1860, of whom 160,770 belonged to the South, and 69,909 to the Free States. Of the free mulattoes, Virginia contained 23,425, which number added to her slave mulattoes makes a total of miscegenated population of 93,824. Her mulatto slaves alone exceeded the total number of mulattoes in the free States. The whole number of mulattoes, slave and free, in the Union, in 1860, was 588,352, of whom 49,979 belonged to the Free States, and 518,373 to the slave States—a number greater than the combined white population of Arkansas, Delaware and Florida—greater than the white population of Maryland—almost twice as great as that of South Carolina, and twice as great as the combined populations of Delaware and Florida. The mulatto population of Virginia alone exceeds the number of whites in Delaware or Florida.

A dispatch from Baltimore says that on Monday morning, a week, 34 paroled Union officers and 364 private prisoners arrived at Annapolis from Richmond. Such was the condition of the latter that every man of them was admitted to the hospital. One hundred and fifty of them had to be carried from the boat on stretchers and cars. Their looks and words abundantly testify that their miserable condition had been produced by starvation, and many are undoubtedly past the reach of medicine or nourishment.

The Austrian Military Gazette announces that the Emperor Francis Joseph has allowed the formation of a corps of 6,000 volunteers, and 300 sailors for the Empire of Mexico. This corps will consist of three battalions of infantry, a regiment of hussars, a regiment of lancers, a company of pioneers, and a battery of Artillery. The officers will, at their request, be taken from the Austrian army.

On Monday a week, the National Guard of Ohio reported for active duty under the 100 days call, with greater promptness than was expected. Returns have been received from all but 43 companies, and the strength so far is 34,914 men, which will be increased to 38,000 by organizations yet to report.

Advices from Alexandria, Red River, to April 24, state that Gen. Banks was there, then, and in a good position. The rebels had followed our forces from Grand Ecore, and when near Cane River an engagement took place. The rebels lost 1,000 men and 9 cannon.
