WOUNDED IN 5TH PENN'A.

A story is told of two men of the 20th Massachusetts, which well illustrates the pluck of our soldiers and their indifference to danger. In the battle of the Wilderness, the 20th were in the thick of the fight, and one color bearer after another was shot down almost as fast as the men could be replaced. But such was the eagerness to keep the flag afloat that at once two men—Irishmen—caught hold of the standard at once, as it was about to fall, and struggled for it. Just then a shot struck the staff cutting it in two and leaving one man with the flag and the other with the broken stick. "Bedad," said the man with the short end of the staff, "the rebels have decided for us, this time, and went to loading and firing again, as coolly as if nothing had happened."

BELL PLAIN, Friday morning.

DEAR MRS. IRVIN:—I reached this place this evening and was assigned, by my request, to the 5th corps hospital in which the soldiers belonging to the 1st Rifles, and the 149th are placed. From a young man named Littlefield, who is assisting in the hospital, I gathered the following facts which I send by first opportunity.

Wm. Haney, Co. K was killed, May 8th—shot through the head. Montgomery Williams, wounded on the 6th, brought to Fredericksburg and died May 11th at 5th corps hospital—buried near to the factory. John Henry slightly wounded in the arm.

Maj. Hartshorn, Maj. Irvin, Lieut. Kratzer, Bard, James Ross, Enos Bloom, Capt. Holden, Lieut. Ferndorf, Albert Cole, all right on the 10th.

Wm. Wilson was stunned by the concussion of a shell and was in the field hospital.

John Hazlett, was wounded in the back slightly. Edward M. Curry wounded in the leg on the 6th.

The first rifles were sent in front last night with orders to burn up fire all night. No result has been ascertained.

I will write to you whenever I can get information. I hope my letters will all reach.

William Carr, missing. The other Carr, all right. Adam Taylor, finger shot off. John Dehass, in field hospital. Ed Gross, teatner, all right. John Macumer, all right. William Price, all right.

Maj. Hartshorn, Maj. Irvin, Lieut. Kratzer, Bard, James Ross, Enos Bloom, Capt. Holden, Lieut. Ferndorf, Albert Cole, all right on the 10th.

FREDERICKSBURG, May 15th, 1864.
