The houses are nearly all only one story, built of hewn logs with either boards or clapboards nailed over the space on the inside without being either chinked or daubed. Very few of the houses have windows. ion. John Patton, who is decidedly a liv- They commonly have two doors which are working christian. Never have I met open in daylight and afford sufficient light. The roofs are clapboard. I have seen only about a hair dozen good houses in this State. This country is well watered, but the citizens do not seem to use much of it. Their clothing looks as if it had not been washed for weeks. They live apparently in the

roughest kind of backwoods style.
Fruit will be plenty. Rye is in bloom and corn about six inches high. On the morning of the 17th, I found seventeen boxes of army in its sanguinary movements. Boxes Tobacco containing 100lbs each, secreted in the woods close by our eamp, near the Conasauga river.
