The discumstances of Secretary Seward' assassination are thus narrated by a member of his household : A man on horseback

> Mobile Captured! Official despatches, via New Orleans, have cen received, announcing the capture of

the Spanish Fort and Fort Blakely. The former at 10:30 A. M. on the 9th, with 700 prisoners; the latter on the same day by assault, with over 5,000 prisoners and a large amount of ordnance stores. The gunboats and troops proceeded unmolested towards Mobile, which was captured on the evening of the 9th by a portion of Gen. Smith's command, assisted by the light draught boats, after a short resistance by the enemy.

### The Plot.

The National Intelligencer says : We can state on the highest authority that it has been ascertained that there was a regular conspiracy to assassinate every member of the cabinet, together with the Vice President. The names of the severally appointed assassins are, we understand, known, and after the present investigation is concluded and published. the public will be astond ed at the developments."

HIS MEN WOULD NOT FIGHT.-It is said hat pending the negotiations between GRANT and LEE, the rebel soldiers became aware through conversations on the picket line, of the generous terms offered by GRANT, and resolved not to fight any longer. This feeling could not have escaped the observation of LEE, and may have had some little weight with him in determining to bandon a struggle so evidently hopeless.
