The Feeling in Richmond. We have read with a good deal of care, the letters from the city of Richmond which have been published in our exchanges, and we are bound to say, that we see as yet very little indication of a Union feeling in that city.

MURDER TRIAL IN CARLISLE.—Howard Rupert, Lewis Rupert and Henry Rupert have just been tried at Carlisle, for the murder of W. Vansieden, at Centerville, Cumberland county, on the 31st of December last.

KENTUCKY BLACKS IN THE ARMY.—A recent official report shows that 21,000 colored men have been enlisted in the army in Kentucky; 1,000 were drafted; 2,000 ran away and enlisted in Indiana, Tennessee and Ohio.

The Sergeant at Arms of the U. S. Senate, is directed to remove fourthward from so much of the Capitol as is under his care all intoxicating liquors, and hereafter to exclude liquors in every form from the Senate portion of the Capitol.
