COWAPULY ASSAULT. -- On Monday af ternoon, William Hoover, Esq., of Bradtool township, was assaulted in a most cowandly manner by Dave Ashop of Boggs township. Mr. Hoover was siding in J. B. M'-Enally's office, and charaged in conversation. when Askey antored and charged Mr. H. with having made hun (Askey) pay threehondred doilars by encolling him when he . was over age. Mr. H. replied that he had only done his duty to the best of his knowledge, whereupon Askey strack him three or four times in the face, and bruised him severely. Mr. Hoover is an old and inoffensive man, and in quite feeble health, and hence made no resistance whatever to the attack upon him. CHANGES IN THE SCHOOL LAW .- The tollowing changes in the School Law of Penn'a were adopted by the late Legislature :

1. Clerks of the Courts of Quarter Sessions are required to turnish to the State Superintendent a certificate of the formation of any school district, whether by incorporation of a borough, the establishment of an independent district, or the creation of a new reweallip.

The President of a school board is requized to call a meeting of the directors up on a written request of three of their number. In case of refusal, two directors may call a special meeting, and the business than acted thereat shall be legal.

3. It is absolutely necessary, in order to scence a share of State appropriation, that no teacher shall have been employed in the district during the year who had not a valid certificate from the County Superintendent, and also that the school shall have been kept open for the last four months subsequent to the first Monday in June preceding.

4. This section relates to the election of County Superintendent. It provides that the State Superintendent shall commission tuch subordinates as one cortified to have at the trienneal convention , provided that objections be not made. signed by one fifth of the boards of directors of the County, and sworn to by at least three of the signers within thirty days after elec-Lion.

5. The minimum age for a dmissibility into | Shaw, the common School is raised from five to all years.
