He became a traitor in the face of his own assertion that the rebellion was heinous and causeless, an effort of bad men to destoy the best Government the sun shone upon. Alas. poor Stephens! Living to be racked by remorse, he can only die to be consigned to

Robert E. Lee has been tendered and accepted the Presidency of Washington College, a leading Virginia instution of learning. The trustees of Washington College could have done themselves more honor by bestowing their favors on a less prominently obnoxious man, but as the traitors insist that they were not defeated, only overcome by superior numbers, Lee will doubtless busy himself in educating another band of scamps and ingrates like himself, again in the future, when an imbecile like Buchanan can be placed in power, to assail and if possible destroy the Government.
