the Philadelphia and Reading Railroad Company, which has been concluded. The contract provides for the construction of a narrow gague track from the terminus of the Catawissa Railroad at Milton, in Northumberland county, and hence through Union, Centre, Clearfield, Jefferson and Clarion counties, to connect with the Atlantic and Great Western Railroad at or near Franklin, which is to extend the same narrow gauge on this road to Cleveland, Cincinnati and other prominent western cities, thus forming, by the Catawissa and Reading Road and its branches, a continuous line of narrow gauge road between Philadelphia and other prominent cities in the great west. The Reading Railroad Company is to establish the rates of freight westward from Philadelphia, the charge per mile on merchandise or passengers never to be higher than the rate per mile charged to the city of New York, which secures to Philadelphia all the advantages of her geographical positions in the great and growing trade of the west. These two railroad companies have agreed to furnish one half of the capital required to establish a line of steamers between this port
