

### The Amendment.

In the House, on January 31st, Mr. Stevens, from the Joint Committee on Reconstruction, reported what is designated," the Coaklin amendment," which had been recommitted to it the day before, merely striking out the words, "and direct taxes," so that it reads as follows :

"AUTULE-, Representatives shall be appointed among the several States which may be included within the Union according their respective numbers, counting the whole number of persons in each State, including Indians not taxed ; provided, that whenever the elective franchise shall be denied or abridged in any State, on account of any race or color, all persons of such race or color shall be excluded from the basis of representation.

Before voting on the main Amendment, the House, by 130 to 39, rejected General chenck's substitute, which proposed

"That the apportionment shall be accoring to the number of male citizens over wenty-one years of age, having the qualifications requisite for electors of the most numerous branch of the State Legislature.'

And now the vote was taken on the Conkin proposition as amended, with the following result: Yeas, 120; Navs, 46. [The Nays include all the Democrats voting, with Messrs. Raymond, Baldwin, Elliot, Green, Clay Smith, Hale, Harding, Humphrey, Jenekes, Noell, Phelps, Rosseau, and Whaley chosen as Unionists. | The Speaker announced that two-thirds of the House having voted in the affirmative, the House assents to the Amendment.

This Amendment says to each State Judge for yourself as to the right of sufrage within your own limits ; but do not ask other States to count as a portion of the body politic those of your inhabitants of whom you deny that character." In others words: If any state refuses to a portion of her people, the right of suffrage, the portion deprived of that right shall not be counted in representation. Thus, for example, the Southern States, by counting their slave population would have about twenty-six Members of Congress more than they will have if the proposed anrendment f the Constitution should be adopted, unless they permit the negroes to vote, which also by the amendment is proposed to be left to themselves ; if we have a correct understanding of the matter.

The returns of the brewers of Chicago for the year foots up 182,338 barrels of beer and ale, on which there is a Government tax of one dollar per barrel. Reduced to gallons, this amount exhibits 6,924,168 galions of ale and beer made, sold and consumed in Chicago. Estimating its population at 180,000, this would give 381 gallons per annum to every man; woman and child. But, in addition, large quantities of ale, porter, beer, &c., are imported from other plaees, and from abroad, to say nothing of other domestic and foreign liquors.
